

## **Orthodox Young Adults' Retreat 2012**

The third annual Young Adults retreat was held On May 26, 2010, once again in Cochrane Alberta, nestled in the Rocky Mountains just west of Calgary. This year we had participants from St. Vladimir's Ukrainian Orthodox Church (UOCC), St Peter the Aleut Orthodox Church (OCA) and St Mary's Romanian Orthodox Church (ROEA).
